

Bovine TB Investigation Summary

- · Started in September 2016
 - Detection of TB in cow slaughtered in USA which came from an Alberta farm.
 - The herds implicated and the time of year / stage of the production cycle complicated the investigation.
- Effectiveness of the disease control measures and investigation recognized by trading partners
 - No disruption to overall domestic cattle market.
 - No bovine TB related restrictions on live animal or meat export markets.
- Outcomes to date
 - 6 confirmed cases in one infected herd
 - 45,000 animals in 150 herds in Western Canada tested
 - 11,500 animals ordered destroyed with \$39 million in compensation paid to producers.
 - All animals released from quarantine. The investigation is officially closed. Restocking testing will be complete Fall 2018/Winter 2019

Communications challenges and successes

- The scope of the TB investigation grew rapidly and outstripped the normal investigation response and on-farm communication activities.
 - The investigation launched at the worst
 - operations in SE Alberta.


 There was limited engagement with communications in the early days of the investigation. investigation.
 - The operational capacity shortfall was not initially well communicated internally and helped create an information vacuum for producers and the community.



- Standing up the ICS and Emergency Operations Centres started the communications turn around because of improved internal information flow.
 - Lots of ground to make up with producers and media.
 - Industry Liaison embedded in ICS structure and participating in daily "Chief's Meeting"

Financial aspects were key foundation

- Engagement with affected producers about testing and disease control improved as immediate concerns about financial costs were addressed.
 - The Canada-Alberta Bovine Tuberculosis Assistance Initiative (and similar support provided by Saskatchewan) provided support for quarantine costs not covered by Health of Animals compensation.
 - Thorough reviews of compensation files including consideration of production costs with timely delivery of payments also supported cooperation from producers.
