




Pan-Canadian Action Plan

Global Gaps Identified at the One Health Roundtable

Data

 Significant progress has been made in collecting surveillance data, but some gaps still remain to be filled to enable benchmarking and tracking of stewardship and IPC efforts.
 There is an almost total lack of data on the economic impact of AMU and AMR across the sector.

Raising Awareness

 Messaging across the sector and among sectors needs to be consistent and we must raise awareness among politicians and the public to drive change.

Antimicrobial stewardship

 A gradual change in behavior across the sector is needed to optimize antibiotic use and implement alternatives.

Enabling Innovation

If antibiotic use is curtailed, viable alternatives must be available and approved for use.
 Many regulatory and practical barriers exist to the adoption of new interventions.

Potential Areas of Action from One Health Roundtable

Data



- Build a national information hub
- Expand CIPARS data
- Engage the whole community in consistent data collection
- Conduct risk assessments to guide actions
- Provide sustainable support for GRDI

Raising Awareness



- Obtain consistent data relevant to commodity groups
- Create multi-sector working groups
- Develop a communications strategy for the public

Antimicrobial Stewardship



- Develop a shared vision across sectors
- Encourage a voluntary reduction in the prophylactic use of antibiotics
- Do a cost/benefit analysis of the impact of AMR and relative cost of alternatives to antibiotics

Enabling innovation




- Invest in more research on viable and practical alternatives to antibiotics
- Convene a summit to address regulatory barriers with regulatory bodies

Gap analysis

- Using available information, a comprehensive gap analysis has been conducted and several key areas for action have been identified:
 - Raising awareness
 - Shared vision among sectors
 - Enabling innovation
 - Enhanced surveillance and linkage with stewardship programs

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Stakeholder consultation meetings held to date



Preliminary results

- The meetings have been very positive with commitments to collaborate as the development of the PCAP moves forward.
- Communications has been identified as the most single important challenge.
- Many stakeholders have expressed the importance of keeping all parties up to date as we move forward in this process.
- Several actions / initiatives have been identified and have been included in an inventory of all potential actions as the consultation moves forward.

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Potential Areas of focus

- Better data management and sharing
- Greater access to veterinarians
- Effectively sharing best practices.
- Vaccination programs

- Research coordination
- Information exchange hub
- Education
- Better mechanisms to bring the results of research to market.

Drafting of Action Plan

- Four Task Groups surveillance, stewardship, infection prevention and control, research and innovation – initiating their analysis to:
 - Validate and prioritize actions (based on previous work and results of initial stakeholder engagements)
 - Write actions in tangible and measurable way
 - Propose timelines (and success factors) for each action
 - Propose performance indicators
 - Propose action leads and partners
